

Recently, I had the privilege of attending the Ladies Circle South Africa AGM in Cape Town. The professionalism, passion, and commitment on display were exceptional. I left with a renewed appreciation for the strong partnership we share. There is real value in strengthening ties with our fellow Associations, not just socially, but structurally. When we align our missions and collaborate intentionally, the results speak for themselves. Shortly after, I hit the road with President Vos Botha. In Ficksburg, I found a Table that embodies resilience and quiet determination. In Cradock, our visit coincided with the EP Area Winter Conference, a weekend of sharp thinking and genuine connection. One of the standout moments was the "Unstoppable WHY" session, which challenged everyone in the room to reflect on why we do what we do. This clarity of purpose is what drives retention and growth.

It was encouraging to see four new inductions that weekend. That's not just good news for the Area, it's a sign of life in our pipeline. But let's be honest. We have work to do. Right now, 33 of our Tables have only one to four active members. That's a wake-up call, not a red flag. These Tables represent untapped potential. If each one of them brings in just two more members, we will grow by over 60 Tablers. The path is not complicated, it requires consistent effort, follow-through, and leadership at ground level. We can't afford to wait for a turnaround - we have to create it. The months ahead are packed with opportunity; the KZN Tri-Area, the Border Area Mid-Year in Queenstown, and the RTI World Meeting in India, where I'll represent Round Table Southern Africa on the global stage. Each visit is more than just a box to tick, it's a chance to engage, reinforce the

ground.

There's no mystery to growth. It happens where there's purpose, follow-through, and strong leadership. I believe in our Association's future because I see it, in the new members shaking hands at inductions, in the small clubs fighting to stay active, and in the energy of Areas pushing for relevance and results.

From Numbers Tour to Association Exec

David's own Tabling journey began back in 2015, when curiosity led him to ask about Round Table. A single conversation with Kevin and Nico "Big Red" McNamara landed him on Hilton's incoming Numbers Tour. He was barely a week in before he found himself running around helping host international guests on a ten-day adventure. "Thrown into the deep end, but I loved every second of it," he recalls. It was chaos, it was camaraderie, and it was classic Table.

From there, the bug bit hard. He's since served in countless roles at Table and Area level, and represented Southern Africa both locally and abroad. "I've been to places I never would have imagined, doing things only Round Table could offer."

Inkundia Evolves

As we embrace a new term of service and storytelling in Round Table Southern Africa, the Inkundla portfolio has seen a number of strategic shifts aimed at improving the quality, sustainability, and reach of our publication. At the 1st ASSCO meeting of the term, held in Parys on 27 April 2025, a landmark decision was taken to reduce the number of Inkundla Editions from ten to four for the 2025/26 year. This adjustment gives the editorial team the opportunity to shift from a fast-paced cycle to a more deliberate and curated approach to content creation. In addition to our four quarterly digital editions, we will also produce two exciting special editions - the Year in Review (in print) and a commemorative 70th Anniversary Edition of Inkundla.

To enhance engagement, a dedicated Inkundla Podcast will now accompany each release. These episodes are designed to highlight upcoming content, provide interviews and behind-the-scenes insights, and allow our contributors to connect more personally with the readership. The content will be delivered in two parts: a pre-release teaser and a more in-depth post-release feature.

Behind the scenes, we are fortunate to be supported by a dynamic working group that brings together diverse talents across writing, editing, design, interviews, and photography. Special thanks must go to the Inkundla Working Group, which includes Greg Bennett, Niel Enslin, AB Tromp, Calvin Parker, Carl van Staden, Keeno Anthony, and Kama Vinga. The Inkundla Podcast is powered by Calvin Smit and Josh Harper.

In our efforts to ensure the sustainability of this portfolio, we have introduced affordable advertising rates for both the magazine and the podcast. This offers businesses and members the opportunity to support Inkundla while enjoying valuable exposure to a dedicated audience. Rates start from as little as R500, with flexible options available across digital and audio formats.

A critical update affecting all Tablers is the impending expiration of the RTSA Issuu subscription, which has served as a central hosting platform for Inkundla and Area publications. The current subscription ends on 15 July 2025 and will not be renewed due to escalating costs. Areas are urged to download and archive their content before this date. RTSA will communicate alternatives shortly to ensure continuity in publication access.

Together, let's continue building a vibrant publication that truly reflects the spirit and service of Round Table Southern Africa.

My first meeting was their AGM. Talk about diving in head-first. But from that first meeting, I was hooked. The camaraderie, the energy, the purpose... it just felt like home.

Namibia Area Fishing Boogie

In February, Cuan made his way to Namibia for the iconic Fishing Boogie. Having fulfilled his Sergeant duties at the Sandown 150 AGM, he set off from Thabazimbi on the Saturday evening, joining McCee Smit and Jan-Albert de Kock, affectionately dubbed "Pensie de Kock" during the trip. 
Eastern Province Area AGM

Journey of Linan



Running Toward Redemption

What began as a personal commitment soon became a powerful journey of discipline, faith, and purpose, inspiring a movement to uplift others. This is the story of how one man chose to run for a cause.

A Story of Change, **Challenge and Purpose**

When Lihann Kriek from Bloemfontein 25 woke up on 19 January 2025, he had no idea that a quiet decision made in the solitude of self-reflection would lead to a life-changing transformation, not just for himself, but for others too. What began as an internal shift soon became a public testimony of resilience and purpose, reminding those around him that true change starts from within.

The Turning Point

After ARTSA, Lihann found himself at a crossroads. Years of unhealthy habits had begun to take a toll, not just physically, but spiritually and emotionally. As a father, husband and Christian, he recognised that the man staring back at him in the mirror was not the man he was meant to be. The indulgences that once offered escape now left him drained, disconnected from his calling, and distanced from the vibrant life he envisioned.

With the start of his church's three-week fast the following day, he chose to give up alcohol and cigarettes, privately and sincerely. It was not a public declaration, but a personal commitment between himself and God. This moment marked a reset, an inward promise driven by faith and accountability, forming the foundation of what would become a profound journey of self-reclamation.

Rediscovering Strength Through Struggle

The first week of sobriety was brutal. He faced the storm alone, without even sharing it with his wife. Withdrawal, doubt and internal conflict became constant companions. When he finally opened up to her, she encouraged him to start running again, something he once loved, but had long abandoned. Running had once been a passion, a source of freedom and clarity-now it offered a lifeline.

The return was difficult. Unfit and frustrated, he could barely complete 5km. Yet every painful step was a step forward. His body resisted, but his spirit endured. Slowly, the distances grew longer, and with each run, he began to rebuild not only his stamina, but also his self-worth and confidence. It was in this daily discipline that he started reconnecting with the man he wanted to be.

One Step, One Change, One Life.



Purpose in the Pain

Two months later, still sober and smoke-free, Lihann suffered a hamstring injury, a forced pause that became a moment of reflection. Rather than derail his progress, it solidified his commitment. He used the downtime to dream, to research, and to reimagine his path. From the pain emerged bold aspirations: completing the Comrades Marathon, and conquering the Skyrun, a 100km self-navigated mountain race across the harsh, elevated terrain of the Eastern Cape, known for testing even the most experienced ultra-endurance athletes.

But the dream became more than personal. He envisioned Run for a Cause, a campaign to raise funds for Tablers and community members burdened by medical expenses. In South Africa, many families face overwhelming costs for essential treatments and operations, often without medical aid or adequate support. Each kilometre Lihann runs now carries the weight of a cause far bigger than himself.

Brotherhood in the Midst of Temptation

Remaining alcohol-free during Tabling events is no small feat, especially within a culture where smoking and drinking are social staples. From local functions to ARTSA itself, the temptations were real, yet Lihann remained anchored. He knew that his commitment wasn't just about abstinence, but about redefining what brotherhood, leadership and strength could look like in a modern Table.

Support came in the form of conversations and connection. Engaging with Jacques van Wyk and the Don't Count Yourself Out (DCY) Campaign, he found strength in shared purpose and opened space for dialogue around mental health, a cause close to his heart. In a community where vulnerability is often masked by bravado, Lihann became a voice encouraging open, honest conversation, one that helps normalise seeking help and inspires others to take their own first steps.



Eves on the Horizon

Lihann's focus now turns to Skyrun 2025, a race unlike any other. It begins at 4AM on 15 November and spans 100 unforgiving kilometres over 4,445 metres of elevation. It traverses remote mountain paths, with no trail markers, aid stations or luxuries, just raw nature, resilience and purpose. The Skyrun is more than a race, it is a pilgrimage, demanding extreme physical and mental endurance.

He rises each day at 3:45AM to train, not for glory, but to run for those who can't. Every stride is a tribute to those whose lives are hindered by illness, injury or hardship. His vision is to turn pain into purpose, endurance into empathy, and each run into real, tangible impact through donations, awareness and hope.

The Message

Lihann Kriek's journey is not only about running or giving up bad habits. It is a story of rediscovery, of finding strength through surrender, and of using personal change to serve a greater cause. His transformation serves as a call to action for others, whether they are Tablers, fathers, friends or community leaders, to take one small decision seriously and let it grow into something powerful.

A Life Rebuilt

Through this transformation, Lihann discovered that true strength lies in vulnerability. He shed ego and comfort, confronting his patterns and rebuilding from within. His values shifted, faith, family, health and helping others now take precedence over temporary escape. Where he once sought short-term relief, he now chases long-term fulfilment.

His influence has rippled outward. His wife and children now experience a more present and purposeful husband and father. The bond within his home has deepened, built on presence, empathy and intention. Fellow Tablers have reached out to him, inspired by his courage to change. Some have joined him on runs, others have reached out for guidance, and many more have found in his story the nudge they needed to begin their own.


A Step in the Right Direction



With thousands of spectators descending on the venue to watch some of the country's top motocross athletes compete, the pressure was on, and our team delivered. Over 250 man-hours went into planning, setting up, running, and breaking down the tent across the event weekend. It was a true test of endurance, teamwork, and commitment.

But the results were well worth the effort.

Between the constant stream of guests, the flow of ice-cold refreshments, and the upbeat atmosphere we created, the beer tent became a central point of celebration at the event not only enhancing the experience for motocross fans but also raising a significant amount for our Table.

After covering R42,630 in expenses, we proudly raised a net profit of R17,970, with total funds brought in reaching R60,600. These funds will go directly toward our management account, helping cover the essential running costs of our clubhouse, which serves as the home base for all our community and outreach initiatives.

This project wasn't just about selling beverages, it was about sustaining the heart of our Table's operations, so that we can continue to serve the broader East London community more effectively.

It also reminded us of the core values that define Round Table: hard work, fellowship, service, and fun. In between pulling points, our members shared laughs, built deeper bonds, and engaged with hundreds of people, some of whom were introduced to our organisation for the very first time.

This event also positioned Round Table 1 as a reliable partner for major public functions, opening doors for future collaborations with large-scale sporting events and festivals.



As the cold settles over South Africa's cities and townships, a different kind of warmth begins to spread, not from heaters or hot meals alone, but from

the determined hearts of Tablers standing shoulder to shoulder with the vulnerable.

In Pretoria, that warmth has a name: Warmfees, a communitydriven music and donation festival that began just three years ago and has already become one of Round Table South Africa's most powerful local expressions of the national Winter Knights initiative.

What started as an extension of Martin Bester's, Vir Die Liefde Toer, quickly turned into a full-fledged event that now kicks off winter each year in Pretoria before spreading its impact across cities like Tzaneen, Secunda, and beyond.

A Partnership Forged in Purpose

At the heart of Warmfees is the vibrant partnership with Jacaranda FM, one of the country's most well-loved radio stations. That connection began in 2014, when Round Tabler André Fouchée initiated the relationship with community champion Dianne Broodryk. Since then, the bond has only grown stronger, evolving through key players like Christo Bezuidenhout and now Hein van Rooven.

Today, this partnership fuels not just a successful event, but a national movement of kindness, awareness, and action. "Ons vennootskap raak net sterker," says Hein, and it shows.

More Than Just Blankets

It's difficult to quantify the total value of what Warmfees has raised since its inception. From blankets and non-perishable food to financial donations and winter essentials, millions of rands' worth of support is gathered and distributed each year, reaching homes, shelters, and individuals struggling to survive the cold. But the numbers only tell part of the story. Warmfees is about music, yes, with names like Martin Bester, Kurt Darren, Loufi and more lighting up stages, but it's also about presence, dignity, and hope. It's about standing in front of someone who feels forgotten and saying, "Jy is nie alleen nie."



Moments That Matter

There are countless stories that emerge from each Warmfees, too many to count. But for Hein, one of the most meaningful things is seeing Tablers walk alongside artists, bridging passion with purpose.

"Secunda se Warmfees is al só gevorder dat daar geen gelyke aan daai fees in hulle area is nie," Hein shares.

"Tzaneen volg nou vinnig, en selfs Pretoria het vanjaar vir die eerste keer 'n ordentlike fees aangebied, iets wat ons lank beplan het."

From small beginnings, Warmfees has grown into something both structured and soulful, a festival of giving where music and community meet at the intersection of empathy and energy.

The People Behind the Power

While each Warmfees relies on its own network of local sponsors, the true driving force is twofold: Round Table and the public support catalyzed by Jacaranda FM's broadcasts. The coordination, the conversations, and the groundwork each year start with a planning session between Round Table reps and Martin Bester, laying out where, when, and how to serve best.

It's a reminder that real change is always collaborative, and always personal.

Looking Forward: Bigger, Better, Bolder

The dream for Warmfees isn't just survival, it's expansion. National events, greater awareness, and more lives touched. "Ons het groot drome," says Hein, "en hoewel ons nie kan kla nie, is daar nog soveel potensiaal."

With each passing winter, the movement grows, not just in size, but in soul.

On to the next one...

In a world that often turns away from the cold and the desperate, Warmfees stands as a joyful contradiction: a celebration built on compassion, driven by music, and powered by people who believe that warmth isn't just something you feel, it's something you give.



Die Eksperimenteringsfase: Die Fondasie van **Doeltreffende Projekte in Round Table**

Dit is 'n gestruktureerde en doelgerigte proses wat vir Round Table-klubs die geleentheid bied om nuwe idees op 'n beheerde, klein skaal te ondersoek. Dit stel ons in staat om te sien hoe 'n konsep in die werklikheid funksioneer sonder om dadelik groot hulpbronne of tyd in te sit. Die fase dien as 'n beskermingsmeganisme teen mislukking, en verseker dat ons pogings op 'n verantwoordelike en volhoubare manier ontplooi word.

Wanneer 'n nuwe projek-idee ontstaan, word dit eers teen die kernwaardes van Round Table gemeet. Stem dit ooreen met ons strewe na vriendskap, diens en leierskap? Getuig dit van die innoverende gees wat ons beweging dryf? Indien wel, word 'n loodsprojek ontwikkel, 'n kleiner weergawe van die uiteindelike projek. Hierdie weergawe stel die span in staat om die praktiese uitvoerbaarheid van die projek te toets en waardevolle terugvoer te versamel, sonder om die hele organisasie of begroting te belas.

Wat die eksperimenteringsfase so waardevol maak, is dat dit gefokus is op leer. Dit gee vir spanne die kans om nie net sukses te meet nie, maar ook struikelblokke betyds raak te sien. Terugvoer vanaf deelnemers, gemeenskapslede en selfs ander Tafelaars word ingesamel, geanaliseer, en gebruik om die projek te

verbeter. As 'n fondsinsameling-veldtog byvoorbeeld nie die verwagte resultate lewer nie, bied die eksperimenteringsfase die geleentheid om die strategie aan te pas voordat dit op 'n groter skaal bekendgestel word.

Die krag van die eksperimenteringsfase lê in die vermoë om idees te versterk deur praktiese toepassing. Dit moedig 'n kultuur van nadenkende aksie aan, waar kreatiwiteit gebalanseer word met verantwoordbaarheid. Vir Round Table beteken dit dat ons nie net dien nie, maar dien met doel en deursigtigheid. Elke loodsprojek is 'n belegging in toekomstige impak. Om hierdie fase as standaardpraktyk te aanvaar, is om ons verbintenis tot leierskap, vernuwing en dienswerk te bevestig. Dit herinner ons daaraan dat werklik betekenisvolle projekte nie toevallig gebeur nie. Hulle word gebou, getoets, en voortdurend verbeter, deur mense wat bereid is om te leer, aan te pas en weer te probeer. En juis daarin lê die hart van Round Table: om aan te neem, aan te pas en te verbeter.



How Mpumalanga Tables Turn Small 'Change' Into Lasting Impact

In an inspiring show of community spirit, all five active Tables in the Round Table Mpumalanga Area have contributed meaningfully through donation drives tailored to their regions. From handing out R5 coins to sharing R10 notes, these thoughtful gestures have grown into significant collections of food, clothing, blankets and toiletries. Each project has helped meet real needs in their local community, and the collective impact has been truly uplifting. Here is a look at the role each Table played within their community.

White River 64 - The R10 That Keeps on Giving

At the White River SuperSpar, White River 64 continued their much-loved R10 Donation Drive Project. This recurring initiative, held 2-3 times a year, invites shoppers to accept a R10 note and use it or top it up with their own money to purchase non-perishable goods such as rice, pasta, canned food or toiletries. Some donors even return the R10 note with their purchase, allowing it to circulate throughout the day. Starting off with just R1,000 in R10 notes, the White River Table managed to gather goods to the astonishing total of R24,559.57. This simple idea continues to inspire a spirit of generosity year after year.



Secunda 231 - Grit, Cold Winds and Big Hearts

On an icy morning (below sub-zero weather with chilling winds) members of Secunda 231 set up for their Winter Knights Project at the Boere Mall in Secunda. Despite the cold, the team drew in crowds with boerewors rolls and collected a wide range of donations. The effort was led by Pipeliners Timm'y' Lourens (Convenor) and Reece 'Jester' Palmer (Coconvenor), who had only recently progressed to Pipeliners from active guests earlier this year. Timm'y' generously funded the day's activities which came to a total of R1,629.94, and by the end, the Table had raised goods worth R10,209.94, along with 40 hours of community service hours. Their dedication showed how new members can make a real impact and follow in the footsteps of those Tablers before them.

Barberton 67 - Food **Hampers from Afar**

Barberton 67 opted for a structured approach to their Food Drive Project. Under the leadership of Pipeliner Dean Byleveld, the Table sent out appeal letters requesting businesses and community members to sponsor food hampers, each valued at R453.42. The hampers, sourced from Johannesburg, were delivered to families in need in the Barberton area. The campaign raised R9,500 in total and contributed 16 hours of community service work. It was a practical and efficient way of supporting the community.

Powerlines 239 - A R5 Coin That Made a Difference

At Saveways SuperSpar in eMalahleni, Powerlines 239 ran a simple but effective R5 Coin Campaign using R5 coins to encourage food donations. Once the idea was explained, shoppers were quick to join in, purchasing various non-perishables for the cause. The effort resulted in approximately R14,454.33 worth of goods being distributed to local residents, backed by 27 hours of community service worked. It proved once again that even the smallest gesture can spark meaningful change.



Middelburg 126 - Winter **Knights on a Mission**

Middelburg 126 continued their Winter Knights Project by spreading the word across social media and within the local community. The call for blankets, warm clothes and non-perishable food circulated widely and brought in muchneeded support. The project reflects the Table's longstanding commitment to helping others, particularly during the colder months.

Medic Rush 2025 Brings Healing and Hope to Tsumkwe's Remote

From 26 to 29 May 2025, the annual Round Table Hochland 154 Medic Rush once again brought vital healthcare to some of Namibia's most isolated communities. Travelling over 1,650 kilometres from Windhoek to Tsumkwe and surrounding villages such as Ben-se-Pos, N#ama and Dou, this year's initiative reached far beyond medical assistance - it offered dignity, relief and connection.

Now in its 18th year, the Medic Rush was originally shaped by the vision of neurologist and 41er, Dr Vaja Zatjirua. What began as a small outreach has grown into a significant humanitarian project that delivers essential healthcare to areas where hospitals and clinics are hundreds of kilometres away. In Tsumkwe's case, the nearest hospital is in Grootfontein, 280 kilometres away.

This year's effort saw 750 patients receive free medical care. For many, it was the first time they had access to a professional consultation in years. Medicines and supplies worth approximately N\$240,000 were dispensed, all at no cost. The outreach also included the distribution of sanitation items such as soap and hand sanitiser to assist in preventing disease outbreaks.

A team of 22 healthcare professionals – including doctors, nurses, students and interns - volunteered their time, converting community spaces into makeshift clinics. Their work was supported by 13 dedicated members of Round Table Hochland 154, under the leadership of convenor Matthew Vudzijena, who ensured seamless logistics and coordination.

The 2025 Medic Rush proved once again that when medical care meets genuine commitment, lives are not only changed - they are uplifted. For Tsumkwe and its neighbouring villages, the journey of this convoy of compassion brought more than healing. It delivered

Money may make the world go round, but pizza - it seems brings Tables together like little else. Over three hours, Windhoek's finest thin base pizzas made their way from kitchen to table, the highlight being the venue's signature Smokey Mare pizza, topped with smoked brisket, camembert, and red wine caramelised onions.

The admittance fee included a drink and, more importantly, a warm welcome into the spirit of camaraderie.

In a surprise highlight, the evening saw four brave volunteers take on a fiery challenge: consuming four slices of extra spicy pizza and downing a Zamalek in record time. 41er Romeo Arendse took home the glory - and a N\$400 voucher - with Walvis Bay Vice Chairman PJ Badenhorst earning a respectable second place and a N\$200 prize. RT 34's Bottomless Pizza evening met - and exceeded - its dual purpose: raising essential clubhouse funds and creating lasting fellowship moments. The stories shared, the memories made, and the bonds formed have reaffirmed the club's mission and purpose.

The overwhelming success has already set the wheels in motion for another edition later in the year. Because at the end of the day, when fellowship is served hot, who could ever say no to another slice?



Opinion: FEBRUARY HURTS - And It's Time We Did Something About It!

The numbers don't lie. Clubs across the association are seeing a pattern of resignations and disengagement, especially in February. But behind each statistic is a choice – and a challenge.

What will we do differently?

There is no way to sugar-coat it: February is tough. Whether you are a business owner, manager or auditor, it is likely the month that marks your financial year-end. That means stock takes, provisional tax submissions, budgets to finalise and rolling over to a new fiscal year. It is mentally, physically and financially demanding But for Tablers, February carries an even heavier burden. In the world of Round Table, February is resignation season. It is when leadership councils transition, and men who've turned 40 are gracefully exited from the brotherhood. It is also the time when resignations quietly trickle in - often unnoticed until it is too late. And if we are honest with ourselves, we know the reasons all too well: rising costs, limited time, and diminishing returns on the personal investment into this organisation we claim to love.

Take a look at the figures. In just three years, Windhoek 34 has declined from 11 to 7 active members. That is a 36% drop in membership. While some of these are positive transfers to clubs at

the coast due to new opportunities, a win for Round Table as a whole, the broader trend is clear. And it is not just about money or time.

The competition is not asleep. Rotary, Lions, motorcycle clubs, sports leagues, even online communities, are all offering spaces where men feel valued, heard and inspired. Some are cheaper. Some offer more flexibility. Some are simply better at staying relevant. But this is not the time to look outward. This is the time to look inward. We need to ask ourselves some hard questions. Are we truly offering value to our members? Are we creating opportunities for real connection and growth? Are we adapting to the realities of today's younger generation, who are not drawn to tradition for tradition's sake?

The good news is that the solutions are within reach.

We can start by launching a feedback survey. Show our members that their voices matter. We must create new ways to get involved, perhaps more family-friendly initiatives, more mentoring, or more project-based involvement.

It is about engagement.

Or rather, the lack thereof.

Here's a simple truth: people don't pay

for what they don't use. If you're not actively participating in events, if you're not connecting with your fellow Tablers, if you're not feeling heard - then why stay? Low engagement is a slow and silent killer. Members begin to fade into the background. They stop attending meetings, ignore comms, and slowly disappear. It doesn't happen overnight, but the result is the same. One less seat at the table. One less brother in arms.

This disengagement is contagious. Even your most active, fired-up Tabler begins to feel the void when others don't pitch up. Fellowship fades. Motivation drops. And eventually, they start asking themselves: is it really worth it?

Round Table is worth fighting for, but only if we're willing to change.

We need to be louder about our impact - in our communities, in our friendships, and in our personal growth. We must train and empower our leadership to serve, not just to manage. And above all else, we need to stop making excuses and start making changes.

Only once we've stemmed the outflow, once we've reignited the passion among our current members, should we shift our energy to attracting new ones. Otherwise, we are simply pouring water into a bucket full of holes.

Round Table is a 98-year-old organisation with a heartbeat that still pulses strong. It offers so much. But we, its current stewards, must be brave enough to admit that we are the reason it's bleeding. And we must be bold enough to pull the handbrake, course correct and lead it into a future that our founders would be proud of.

Just imagine: you're 75 years old. You walk into a Round Table reunion as a proud 41er. The fire is still alive. The stories are flowing. The legacy is intact, because back in 2025, you decided to do something about it.

Wake up, Tablers. The legacy is in our hands. And history will judge us not by what we inherited, but by what we chose to pass on.

From Noddy to the Berg

My 7-Year Table Tale

Seven years ago, I walked into a meeting at Kloof 190 because a guy named Matthew Helm reckoned I'd be a good fit for Round Table. Little did I know that one introduction would change the course of my life, not just socially or in service, but for my family too.

From day one, I've held a portfolio, jumping straight in, sleeves rolled up. And for the past four years, I've been privileged to serve as a Chairman in various forms, now ending my tenure as Area Chairman. Leadership has shaped so much of my Table journey, but so has passion, especially my passion for events. Before Table, I was already running wild with ideas through The Gentlemen's Club, but Table gave that energy a purpose. Being able to channel that creativity into fundraising, hosting, and creating impact? Game-changing.

"Round Table didn't just give me a platform to serve, it gave my creativity purpose, my leadership direction, and my family a community to belong to."



At Kloof 190, I found my footing. One of my proudest achievements there was starting the Annual Golf Day fundraiser, an idea brewed over beers (as most good ones are), and it's still swinging strong seven years later. That sense of legacy has always stuck with me. Then there's the moment my childhood and adult life hilariously collided: as a kid, I sat wide-eyed at the Uncle Jumbo's Christmas Show... never imagining I'd one day be Noddy on that very stage. Bell hat and all. That was the magic of Kloof, you didn't just join a Table, you joined a family, a circus, and a theatre troupe all in one.

I later transferred to Westville 189, at a time when the Table had only three active members and barely a fundraiser in sight. But in true Round Table fashion, we rallied. Over two years, we grew the membership to eight, reignited the fundraising calendar, and laid the foundation for the strong, thriving Table they are today.

Even while at Westville, I was already showing face at Sani 152 events, supporting their efforts and slowly building friendships with the brothers in the Berg. That connection deepened year by year, until my wife and I made the decision to pack up our lives, kids and all, and relocate to Underberg for a fresh start. We knew we wanted a better quality of life for our family, but we also knew we wouldn't be doing it alone. The support system through Sani 152 gave us the courage to take the leap.

And while it's been rewarding, I won't pretend it's been easy. Moving towns and starting from scratch has come with challenges, financial pressure, isolation, and the kind of quiet stress that creeps in when no one's looking. It's weighed heavy on my mind at times. But having an incredible, supportive wife and a group of Table brothers who genuinely care? That's been my saving grace. Conversations around the fire, helping hands, and open ears have reminded me that this movement is just as much about mental health as it is about service.

Now, as an official member of Sani 152, I'm gearing up to run my first local fundraiser: "Jail & Bail," with the goal of raising R30,000. (If you see community members behind bars, don't worry - it's only temporary. And only slightly dramatic.)

From my days as Noddy to now chasing bail money, Table has given me more than I ever imagined, purpose, creativity, leadership, and most of all, friendship. The connections I've built across the country, and even internationally, have made the biggest impact on my life.

Every journey begins with a single step, but it's the footprints we leave behind, in service, in friendship, in impact, that truly define our legacy. Keep walking. Keep growing.

Augrabies 273's Enduring Bond with Oranje Rus

In the sunbaked heart of the Northern Cape, where the landscape is as tough as its people, there's a quiet tradition of tenderness that's been growing stronger for over two decades. Round Table Augrabies 273's deeply rooted relationship with the Oranje Rus Retirement Home began around 2003, sparked by the compassion of their 41'ers, and today it remains one of the Table's most beloved and enduring community service projects. What makes this initiative so special isn't just its longevity, it's the way it brings joy, dignity, and connection to the elderly, many of whom feel forgotten in their later years. It's about hot potjie, warm arms, and even warmer hearts.

Every year, Tablers from Augrabies 273 arrive at Oranje Rus with open arms and full pots. Their most recent visit featured a hearty spread of three potjie options, afval, skaap, and hoender, served with rice. The clear favourite? Afval, hands down. "Ons was knie diep in die pot," one member laughed, as they recalled the chaos of accidentally forgetting dessert. But no one seemed to mind. The joy was in the moment, not the menu.

For the gentlemen residents, there's always "ietsie om die kele nat te maak," while everyone is encouraged to bring along plastic containers to take home leftovers, a thoughtful touch that makes the care stretch beyond

It's not only the food or gifts that matter. It's the presence. "Die ou mensies wil altyd die kinders vashou en drukkies gee," shared one Tabler, describing bittersweet scenes of affection and loneliness. For some, these visits are the only time in the year when they feel seen, and held.







Projects like this remind us that service doesn't always require scale, only sincerity. One visit. One warm meal. One memory made. That's all it takes to change someone's day, and sometimes, their life. Let us not forget those whom the world so easily forgets. Let us be there, as Augrabies 273 has been, with a pot, a smile, and a heart wide open.



The project's heart beats strongest when generations come together. Children run between wheelchairs, laughter echoing in the halls. One year, the kids took turns spinning each other around in one of the residents' wheelchairs, a moment of pure joy that blurred the line between giving and receiving. While the older members have long carried the torch, younger Tablers are being drawn in too, often through simple things like Facebook posts. "Ons maak seker om foto's van die kuier op ons Facebook blad te plaas en tag ons lede om bewustheid te skep onder die jonger manne." It's working. Slowly, the seed planted by the 41'ers is being nurtured by a new generation of men with hearts just as committed.

Fundraising for Oranje Rus is handled through raffles and prize draws, and the proceeds go toward maintaining the home, fixing rooms, improving communal areas, and even adding new books to their modest library. It's not glamorous work, but it's deeply necessary.

The men of Augrabies 273 don't do it for recognition. They do it because it feels right. Because, as Rupert Viljoen said, "we never know where life will take us."

As long as Round Table Augrabies exists, its members say, they hope to continue this legacy, not just of service, but of shared humanity. "Elke lid van ons se harte is in hierdie projek," one member said. And it shows.

Footprints Across Southern Africa

The South Cape Story

In Round Table, we often speak about impact, about service, about legacy, about community. But impact is not always about fanfare or flashing cameras. Sometimes, it's quieter. Sometimes, it looks like a child hearing for the first time. Or a family sleeping a little warmer under a donated blanket. Or a beach, cleaner by just one plastic bottle at a time. In the South Cape, our Tables may be small in number, but never in heart. From Knysna to Oudtshoorn, from George to Mossel Bay, we've left behind more than footprints in the sand. We've changed lives. We've answered calls for help. And

we've done it together. Here are four stories, four powerful footprints, that tell the tale of what's possible when Tablers rise to meet the moment.

Knysna 59: Baby Zaiden and the Sound of Hope

When Knysna 59 was officially rechartered in 2025 after a five-year silence, no one expected our first call to action would come so soon, or be so urgent.

A local paediatrician contacted us. A young boy, Zaiden, was losing his hearing rapidly. Without an urgent and specialised procedure, he would become completely deaf. But there was no medical aid, and no time to wait.

We were a brand-new team. We could have said, "We're not ready." Instead, we said, "Let's go." We rallied. We fundraised. We booked appointments, managed logistics, and refused to give up. And when Zaiden woke up after the procedure, the world sounded different, for the first time, he could truly hear.

What followed was remarkable. A boy who once struggled to form words now speaks in full sentences. His parents, once unsure how to help him, are now watching his personality bloom.

That's what a footprint looks like.

And this is just the beginning. Knysna 59 is dreaming bigger, planning a regional hearing health campaign to help even more children like Zaiden. Because no child should go unheard.



George 30: Santa Flight — Christmas at 10,000 Feet



From Flicker to Flame. The Revival of Cape Town 9



How agility, strategy, and a little cheekiness reignited RT9's purpose.

In early 2023, Cape Town 9, one of the last remaining city Tables in the Cape Town metro, stood on the edge of closure, again.

The Table had dwindled to just three members. They met monthly in a clubhouse big enough for a rugby team, yet empty enough to echo. With one member in Melkbosstrand, another in the Northern Suburbs, and only one near their "home base," the team joked that internal communication needed a toll gate.

This was not unfamiliar ground. In 2019, the Table had clawed its way back from a single member to six. But with an average age of 37 and time marching on, momentum was hard to sustain. Then came COVID. Online meetings replaced socials, DIY nights filled the calendar, and the energy slowly faded. By 2023, most had aged out or stepped back for family and work. Still, the Table did not fold.

Two transfers, from East London 1 and Durbanville 165, brought just enough spark to keep going. For two years, it remained a trio. Same faces, same voices, same jokes. New guests often felt like they had joined a book club. Projects dragged. But instead of closing, Cape Town 9 got strategic.

In 2024, they embraced a new approach. Facebook ads, BNI networks, and community-focused events replaced the old playbook. They also improved the guest experience, shorter meetings, fewer formalities, and refreshments covered by admin funds. The goal, make it easy, make it fun, make it memorable.

They reached out to Tables across South Africa, asking for referrals. Friends, cousins, colleagues, anyone moving to Cape Town. The response was positive. And it worked.




By 2025, Cape Town 9 had doubled its numbers. With six members, two pipeliners, and regular guests, the Table is not only surviving, it is thriving. The energy is high, the average age is lower, and the mix of fresh ideas with seasoned experience, including a past and current Area Chairman, has given the club renewed direction.

Cape Town was once home to over seven thriving clubs, complete with clubhouses, properties, and legacy projects. But like many metros, retaining young Tablers has been a challenge. Cape Town 9, however, refused to become another obituary.

Instead, the club redefined what Table could look like in a modern city, agile, persistent, and community-driven. They proved that even a small Table, with the right mindset and maybe a few smart Facebook ads, can spark something lasting.

To any Table facing low numbers or uncertain futures, this is proof. It is worth it. Sometimes, all it takes is three committed Tablers, one braai, and a shared dream.







Your Difference Makes the Difference

In the guiet heart of the Karoo lies Cradock 37, a Table where tradition meets transformation. Here, a new voice is beginning to echo through the halls of Round Table, a voice rooted in compassion, leadership, and service. Meet Lizwi Mdolomba, a health care professional, restauranteur, and foster parent, who recently began his journey as a pipeliner at Round Table Cradock 37. His story reminds us of the power of living authentically, serving humbly, and leading purposefully.

A Life Already Lived in Service

in Queenstown and now firmly rooted in Cradock, Lizwi carries many titles, father, professional, entrepreneur, but the one he holds dearest is "foster parent." His life's work is deeply personal. "Before I heard about Round Table, my choices already resembled those of a Tabler," he says, reflecting the many lives he has quietly touched over the years.

When not working or running his restaurant, you'll likely find Lizwi exploring new destinations or buried in a leadership book. "My newest hobby is my online Afrikaans classes," he shares with a smile, proving that growth never stops, no matter where you are on your journey.

Difference Drives Impact

A Vision Rooted in Purpose

Lizwi's vision for his Table journey is clear: to serve with impact. Drawing from his professional background, he sees opportunities to address real health challenges among youth. "Young people are making life-altering choices without understanding the consequences. As Tablers, we could create programmes in high schools to promote healthy living and informed decision-making."

He's also passionate about extending the reach of Round Table's healthcare-related projects. "I was particularly inspired by the ARTSA and SANBS blood donation collaboration. I want to contribute meaningfully to similar initiatives."





Finding Round Table

Lizwi's introduction to Round Table came not through marketing or social media, but through a personal connection. "Through my business dealings, I met Harland Willard, a 41er, who became like a big brother. After a conversation about Round Table's values, I was intrigued." That conversation led to an invitation from Tabler John Tom, and the rest, as they say, is history in the making.

His early experience in Table life has been nothing short of eyeopening. "ARTSA in Parys was a highlight. I made notes during the conference that continue to shape me," he says. More than just events and meetings, Lizwi is inspired by the depth of commitment he's seen in others. "I love to see how passionate people are about this organisation."

Bringing Difference to the Table

What makes a great Table? For Lizwi, it's not about sameness, it's about celebrating what each individual brings. "We often focus on our similarities, but it's the differences that create value. Your difference is what makes the difference."

In just a short time, Lizwi has articulated a perspective that is both mature and refreshing. He believes a Table works best when its members are self-aware, intentional, and driven by a shared goal. "Commitment to a common vision is the starting point, but the true magic lies in understanding and appreciating what sets us apart."




Calling Others to the Cause

Lizwi reminds us that you do not need to have decades of Table experience to lead with impact. Sometimes, all it takes is a heart for service and the courage to bring your difference to the table.

After ARTSA 2025 in Parys, Kama had the opportunity to once again share his aspirations, this time in front of the newly elected Association Executive Council and four Past Association Presidents. It was a powerful moment, reflecting just how far his journey has progressed since that initial conversation in 2022.

Kama's vision is both local and global. At home, he seeks to strengthen the bonds between Tables across Southern Africa, creating a sense of unity that surpasses borders and fosters a shared identity. Internationally, he hopes to position RTSA as a formidable voice in the global Round Table community, building meaningful relationships and promoting the values that define the region.








Casey van der Merwe, 11 - Kokstad 35

From her very first taste of the Round Table world, it was clear that Yolandi Gray-Browne was not just going to observe from the sidelines. Her journey began with a night out at the East London City Hall to watch Melodrama, a moment that would unknowingly shape her future. When her husband Gareth was later approached to join Round Table, the decision came as naturally as breathing. There was no hesitation. They both knew it would not simply be a commitment, it would become a lifestyle, a family, and a shared purpose.

A defining moment for her came during a blanket drive at Beacon Bay Retail Park. Although going through a difficult time personally, Gareth encouraged her to join him for the handover in the Ducats area. That day, the joy and gratitude in the eyes of those receiving the blankets left a lasting imprint on her heart. It was a moment of pure connection, where humanity, compassion, and service collided in the most beautiful way. It reminded her of why this community exists.



The projects they tackled as a Circle were not just events, they were heartfelt missions. One that stood out was their Quiz Night in support of the Cinderella Fund, a project that quietly supported two local students over three years. From providing basics like school uniforms and groceries to creating a full fairytale matric farewell, the initiative exemplified the heart of Ladies Circle. Seeing those two girls transformed into princesses for a night was nothing short of magical.

Another unforgettable moment came during a Santa Shoebox Project at a home outside East London. As the team arrived, they were met by more children than they had gifts for. But the magic happened in the most unexpected way. The house mother explained the situation with such grace, and the children, many of whom had very little, simply shared what they had without complaint. It was an emotional reminder of humility, generosity, and the deep bonds that come from true community.

As Gareth became a proud member of Round Table East London No. 1 around 2012, Yolandi found herself immersed in the energy that surrounded the organisation. Though initially not a member herself, she was there through it all, watching projects come to life, attending functions, and listening intently to stories from meetings. The values, structure, and sense of purpose ignited something within her. She wanted more than to just witness the magic, she wanted to be a part of it.

Soon after, as East London Ladies Circle 23 began to form, it felt like destiny. Having seen the heart of Round Table, Yolandi did not hesitate when invited to be part of something new. She proudly became a founding member, taking on the role of PRO during the in-formation period and the year after their charter. From there, she stepped up to every portfolio over time, ultimately serving her first term as Chairman in 2016. In fact, she has never had a year without serving on council, such was her dedication and passion for the Circle.

As her Circle journey expanded beyond the local level, Yolandi embraced opportunities to serve at a national scale. In 2017, she attended her first LCSA AGM and began her two-year term as National Treasurer. Her passion for nurturing new Circles became a highlight of her leadership. East London LC23 acted as the Godmother Circle to Newcastle Crowns LC28 and later to Midlands LC42. Helping guide these Circles from their first meetings to full charters brought her a sense of purpose and pride that words can hardly capture.

Travel also became a big part of her Circle story. From her first solo road trip to a Council meeting in Swellendam to attending charters across the country and international gatherings such as the Mid-Term Meetings in Cape Town and Harare, she embraced each opportunity. Whether driving long distances alone or attending events abroad, one thing always remained true, she was never truly alone. Circle had gifted her with a network of friends across South Africa and the globe, all bound together by shared values and friendship.
