The Rob Bentele Story

From mud huts to mountains, from island hunger to lasting purpose. Survivor SA's Rob Bentele shows that true strength is forged where grit meets grace.

From Zululand to the World

Rob Bentele's story begins in Empangeni, where an Austrian father and a Zulu mother gave him a heritage that spans continents, cultures, and ways of seeing the world. He laughs when he describes his childhood as "a life lived in chapters". One chapter unfolds in rural Zululand, where he slept in a mud hut without electricity. Another takes him to Europe, navigating trains, airports, and city lights. The next sees him in Gingindlovu, learning the rhythms of small town life.

Those early shifts shaped a young man who learned to adapt rather than resist. He learned to listen deeply. He learned to bridge worlds instinctively. And he learned that belonging is not given, it is built.

Whenever his parents sensed entitlement creeping in, they sent him back to the homestead. There he fetched water at dawn, bathed outside in icy winter air, and cooked over an open fire. Those experiences never left him. They built an inner toughness that no challenge could easily shake. "It teaches you humility," he reflects. "It teaches you how strong you can be when everything familiar is stripped away."

I wanted to belong everywhere, so I learned to listen and connect.

A Life Always Reaching Higher

Long before the world met him on television, Rob was already testing his limits. At fifteen he hurled himself off the world's highest bungee bridge. At twenty one he stood at the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro. Adventure is not a hobby for him, it is a compass. A way of checking who he is becoming.

That relentless hunger for challenge set the stage for the defining experience that would put him on the map: **Survivor South Africa**.

Forged in Iron, Written in Ink

Rob often says the mind gives up long before the body. That belief shaped his life after Survivor as much as it shaped the game itself. For him, “iron” represents the refusal to bend when the moment demands resilience. It is the courage to push when comfort calls your name. It is the discipline to keep moving forward even when fear whispers the opposite. He sees this philosophy reflected in every meaningful chapter of his life, in childhood, in competition, in leadership, and in service.

Discomfort is temporary. The reward of pushing through lasts forever.

“Iron is how you endure. Ink is what you choose to carry.” If iron forged Rob’s resilience, ink represents his reflection, the wisdom, scars, and stories etched into him through hardship, triumph, and reinvention.

His ink today is written through service. Because what many people do not realise is that Rob’s journey did not end with reality TV. Instead, he used the doors it opened to champion charitable work across multiple communities in KwaZulu-Natal and beyond. He has raised funds, mobilised support networks, fed families, and used his platform to spotlight social issues that don’t trend easily on social media.

Right now, his personal mission is simple and absolute: Feed the hungry. Empower communities. Create real opportunities for people who feel forgotten. It is a calling that echoes the deepest values of Round Table: service above self, fellowship above ego, and impact above recognition.

The Island That Forged Iron

When Survivor SA called, Rob didn’t see a TV show. He saw a crucible. A place to measure himself honestly. A battlefield of mind, body, and soul, the very words he uses to describe his identity.

And when he stepped onto that island, the test was harsher than he imagined. Six days with almost no food. A handful of rice as a daily ration. A body weakening to the point of dizziness. A mind that had to stay razor sharp while the world spun. “You feel your body eating itself,” he says. “But I learned that the mind holds more strength than we ever give it credit for.”

He built fires. He steadied the tribe. He became a source of comfort during chaos. And behind the scenes, he played the real game, the social game, with finesse. Alliances within alliances, trust built brick by brick, stability when others felt unstable.

It was this combination of strategic intelligence, emotional awareness and physical grit that ultimately crowned him Winner of Survivor South Africa.

But it did more than that, it introduced him to a global audience and placed him among the international Survivor community, where he continues to serve as an informal ambassador for the franchise. His later appearance on Survivor Australia: Champions vs Contenders and Survivor Australia vs The World only broadened that reach, cementing him as a familiar face within a global brotherhood of past contestants.








What's Happening in **THE AREAS**

MOEGGESUKKEL PROJECT: TEN NEW HOMES AND FRESH HOPE DELIVERED

A dream has officially become reality in Pretoria, where 10 Wendy houses, valued at R50,000 each, have been completed and handed over at the Moeggesukkel community project.

The initiative, led by Round Table Pretoria Collective in partnership with GROOTfm 90.5, has provided safe, secure, and dignified housing for 20 people in need. To ensure these homes are not just walls but true places of comfort, GROOTfm also sponsored 20 brand-new beds worth R20,000. What started as a vision to restore dignity and hope has grown into a tangible community achievement.

“Every home delivered here is more than bricks and mortar, it’s about giving people the foundation to rebuild their lives,” said a Round Table representative.

Organisers and beneficiaries alike describe the project as proof of the incredible change that can happen when businesses, organisations, and communities join hands.

With the houses now standing tall, families who once faced uncertainty can finally look forward to a future filled with stability, safety, and hope.

In Eloff Street, Pretoria, hope is being built brick by brick at the Angels Hotel Centre for Disabled Children, thanks to a collaboration between Round Table 136 Pretoria, Build It Pretoria West, and Round Table’s international fraternity.

The project is the construction of a new recreation centre designed specifically for children living with disabilities. Once complete, the facility will provide a safe space for children to laugh, play, and grow with dignity.

“*This isn’t just a building. It’s a symbol of unity, love, and the global spirit of Round Table,*” organisers said. The international involvement highlights the strength of the Round Table network, with support pouring in from members across the globe.

Families and caregivers say the centre will be a much-needed addition, offering both physical and emotional relief to children who often have limited spaces to socialise and experience joy. The project demonstrates the power of partnerships between local businesses, global networks, and community-driven organisations to create lasting change.



TRIUMPH AFTER TRAGEDY

A story of determination and community spirit has brought inspiration to Pretoria after Johan, a dedicated Boiler Maker at Tekbro Engineering, was able to walk again following a life-changing accident.

After a tragic tractor accident, Johan lost both of his legs. Despite the setback, his resilience shone through, he continued working, welding, and even climbing ladders, refusing to let his disability define him.

This remarkable perseverance caught the attention of community partners. Thanks to the generosity of Ice Express and GROOTfm 90.5, who sponsored the full cost of more than R90,000, Johan received two prosthetic legs and rehabilitation support.

Today, Johan is walking again, with renewed hope for the future.

Round Table 136 Pretoria, together with supporters and donors, expressed gratitude to everyone who contributed to making this miracle possible.

“*Johan’s story shows what happens when a community unites behind one of its own. It’s proof that hope and generosity can overcome even the greatest challenges,*” organisers said.


2ND ASSCO HOSTED IN KIRKWOOD

This journey epitomizes the spirit of brotherhood and adventure that defines Table, and I look forward to many more inspiring experiences like this in the years to come.




RT BETHLEHEM 60 WINTER NIGHTS


HARRISMITH BLOOD DRIVE

What difference can five dollars make? For Round Table Hochland 154, the answer is clear:

it can feed a family, restore dignity, and strengthen the chain of community.

Through the N\$5 Project, Round Table Hochland 154 has transformed small change into meaningful impact. With the support of SuperSpar Grove Mall, SuperSpar Maerua, Ultimate Safaris Namibia, Future Media, and Ladies Circle Namibia, a simple N\$5 added at the till becomes food, dignity, and hope for families in need.

Since launch, six successful drives have raised over N\$142,000 in goods, all distributed on the same day they are collected. The strength of the project lies in its simplicity and immediacy, proving that collective action does not need to be loud to be powerful.

The N\$5 Project is a reminder that real change often starts quietly, with a single coin, a shared purpose, and a community in motion.



PEHOVELO'S STORY OF STRENGTH AND RESTORATION

AFTER MORE THAN THREE YEARS OF UNWAVERING EFFORT, PEHOVELO NGHITUKUHAMBAA OF SWAKOPMUND UNDERWENT LIFE-CHANGING SURGERY IN AUGUST 2025, A MOMENT FORGED FROM PERSISTENCE, COMPASSION, AND COMMUNITY. THIS MILESTONE IS NOT ONLY A MEDICAL ACHIEVEMENT BUT ALSO THE CULMINATION OF YEARS OF SOLIDARITY, GUIDED BY THE SPIRIT OF ROUND TABLE SWAKOPMUND 145, WHOSE MEMBERS REFUSED TO LET HOPE FADE.

Every act of service leaves a mark that cannot be erased.



Pehovelo's story is etched deeply into the hearts of those who know him. At just four months old, tragedy struck when burglars threw a burning object through the window of his family's home in the DRC settlement of Swakopmund. It landed where he slept, causing severe third-degree burns to his face, arms, and hands.

The injuries were devastating. He lost his nose and left ear and endured extensive damage to both hands, leaving his fingers fused and immobile. Despite countless surgeries, long hospital stays, and years of therapy, his mobility remained limited. Yet, through every challenge, Pehovelo stood as a symbol of courage, his spirit unbroken.

Over the past few years, Round Table Swakopmund 145, alongside residents, donors, and sponsors, rallied behind him, raising funds, awareness, and unwavering support. Each contribution became another piece of metal in the engine of hope that would one day restore his ability to move, create, and dream.

Their collective determination culminated on 14 August 2025, when a skilled team of surgeons performed a complex operation to restore function to Pehovelo's hands. The procedure involved releasing severe contractures and grafting new skin to rebuild flexibility. His left hand, once locked at a 90-degree angle, was straightened, and several digits were freed, movements many take for granted, but for Pehovelo, a liberation.

The surgery was a success. While future reconstructive procedures may still be required, this first step has already transformed limitation into possibility, redefining what Pehovelo can achieve.

For Round Table Swakopmund 145, this project embodies the true essence of strength in compassion, resilience in action, and unity in service. The Table extends heartfelt thanks to every donor, sponsor, and individual who believed in the mission. A special tribute goes to Liesel Scheffer, the Occupational Therapist who first brought Pehovelo's story to the Table's attention and has guided him through every step of his rehabilitation.

As Pehovelo begins his next chapter, his unbound hands symbolize more than mobility, they represent what can be achieved when hearts unite, compassion turns into action, and a community's iron will is inked into a single life's story.

In the machine that is Round Table Southern Africa, every piece of metal contributes to motion, and every act of service leaves a mark that cannot be erased.



By Hertz 186 Tafelronde is die WinterKnights-projek ondersteun deur 'n gemeenskap wat saamgestaan het soos yster. Elke skenking het hoop en warmte gebring in koue tye. Hul gasheerskap van die Noord-Kaap Area se AJV en die induksiedinee het verder die band van broederskap en leierskap gesmee, waar nuwe bestuurspanne hul plek ingeneem het. Erkenning is ook gegee aan JP van den Berg as Tafelaar van die Jaar en Hechter Sandenbergh as Area Tafelaar van die Jaar – 'n teken van die ink waarmee hul stories onuitwisbaar geskryf is.

Round Table Douglas 224 het met hul Skietdag en die Douglas Dryf gewys dat fondsinsameling ook pret, kameraadskap en gesinsbetrokkenheid kan wees. Hierdie projekte is nie net oor fondse nie, maar oor mense wat saamstaan en herinneringe bou – ink op die bladsye van die gemeenskap. MOVE'MBER CHALLENGE: GETTING MEN MOVING, ONE STEP AT A TIME

Every November, Round Table Southern Africa leads a international initiative that combines fitness, community, and the promotion of men's health. The annual November Challenge, driven by RTSA President Vos Botha, encourages participants to set ambitious personal goals: run or walk 100 km, cycle 300 km or swim 25 km, or take on all three disciplines. Participants have 30 days to complete their chosen challenge, creating a unique opportunity to focus on physical activity and mental well-being.



Men's health remains a pressing concern in South Africa. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death among men, compounded by lifestyle factors such as inactivity, poor diet, and stress. Mental health is equally critical, with suicide rates among men significantly higher than among women. Challenges like Move'mber tackle both physical and mental well-being by encouraging healthy habits, providing structure, and fostering a supportive community. By promoting regular activity, accountability, and friendly competition, the initiative helps participants establish lasting routines, build resilience, and improve overall health outcomes.

While rooted in South Africa, the November Challenge attracts participants from across the world, building a sense of connection and camaraderie that transcends borders. Tablers are encouraged to push themselves, support one another, and celebrate every milestone, no matter the distance achieved.

The challenge is also about mental fortitude. Physical activity offers a constructive outlet for stress, grief, or life transitions, giving participants a space to focus on progress, track results, and find measurable personal growth.

Move'mber is more than just running, cycling, or walking; it is about fostering accountability, building habits, and cultivating a community focused on self-improvement. Each year, the challenge reminds participants that small, consistent actions lead to meaningful change, in fitness, mindset, and life.

By the end of November, every participant emerges stronger, more disciplined, and more connected to the global Round Table community. The initiative embodies the core Round Table values of fellowship, service, and personal development, proving that movement is not just exercise, but empowerment.

With each iteration, the November Challenge grows in scale and impact, inspiring men to take charge of their health and supporting the creation of healthy, resilient communities. Whether a seasoned athlete or a beginner, the challenge encourages everyone to get moving, one step, pedal, or stroke at a time.
